A DIGITAL LOVE STORY INTEGRATING LIVE THEATRE WITH EXTENDED **REALITY (XR) TECHNOLOGY**

James McDermott's new multi-modal play is a timely exploration of love, longing and the challenges of communicating how we really feel. Fusing traditional stagecraft and live theatre with unprecedented use of state-of-the-art immersive film-making and XR techniques, we watch two people try to establish a loving 'real' relationship in a world where all communication and contact is slowly shutting down.

HOW IT WORKS

Senseless combines live on-stage action with projected video design elements, presented as a composite video stream.

A feed is mixed in real-time, from an on-stage camera that is tracked by media server technology. This allows the digital set design to update and change relative to the position of the camera and the actors. This new approach allows the team to explore the use of digital scenography and even allows the actors to interact with digital props and characters. Creating stunning 3D visual effects usually associated with the film and animation industry, the actors appear immersed in a digital landscape.

The online stream will be accompanied by a behind-the-scenes documentary and footage so you can discover how the show was developed and produced.
